The Hills Are Alive with the Sound of Learning Celebrating the 30th Anniversary of the American Austrian Foundation-Open Medical Institute Bone and Joint Surgery Seminars

The city of Salzburg, Austria is known for many things, but especially two: It is the birthplace of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and the setting of the movie *The Sound of Music*. Music aficionados also flock to Salzburg for its annual Easter Festival and the summer Salzburg Festival. But for many faculty at Hospital for Special Surgery, Salzburg conjures a different trove of memories. That's because it is the setting for the annual American Austrian Foundation-Open Medical Institute (AAF-OMI) Salzburg Medical Seminar on Bone and Joint Surgery. This year was a cause for celebration: the program marked its 30th anniversary.

The weeklong immersive seminars were created to bring state-of-the-art medical knowledge to physicians from former Eastern Bloc countries and have expanded to include surgeons from other medically challenged nations. Since its inception, the Bone and Joint Surgery seminar has enhanced the knowledge of nearly 1,000 young orthopaedic surgeons from Albania to Zambia, and more than 43 HSS faculty members have participated by giving lectures and leading hands-on workshops.

The 2025 seminar included 33 orthopaedic surgeons from 22 countries. The program supports the education mission of HSS by providing fellows with knowledge they can take back home and implement in their own countries. "The philosophy is that we're teaching surgeons skillsets that they'll have for the rest of their lives. There's a big push for these fellows to stay in their home countries so they can deliver amazing care to their patients," explained **Mathias P. Bostrom, MD** (Resident 1995, Fellow 1996), Associate Surgeon-in-Chief at HSS, who has participated as a faculty member for the seminar 17 times since 2000.

He had co-led the program with the late **Russell Windsor, MD** (Fellow 1993), whose participation in the seminar began in 1997 and who co-directed the seminar 13 times before his unexpected death in 2022. Dr. Bostrom now alternates co-directing the program with **Daniel W. Green, MD** (Resident 1996), Chief of the Pediatric Orthopaedic Service at HSS, who has participated since 2002.

Narrowing the Knowledge Gap

The AAF is a non-governmental organization established in 1984 to fortify the relationship between the United States and Austria through exchanges in medicine, science, communications, and the arts. The seminars began in 1993 as the Salzburg Weill Cornell Seminars, a collaboration between Weill Cornell Medicine and AAF, and were established by Austrian urologist **Wolfgang Aulitzky**, **MD**, Associate Dean for International Medicine and Distance Learning at Weill Cornell Medicine and Medical Director of the AAF. Austria was considered a bridge between the East and West, a place where physicians from diverse national backgrounds could come together.

Over the years, AAF-OMI seminars have also addressed many other medical specialties, such as cardiology, infectious disease, neurology, psychology, OB/GYN, pediatrics, and oncology, to name just a few. Since 1993, the OMI has awarded more than 29,000 fellowships to physicians from 138 countries.

The first Bone and Joint Surgery seminar took place in 1994 and was directed by **Thomas P. Sculco, MD** (Resident 1974), HSS Surgeon-in-Chief Emeritus, collaborating with Austrian orthopaedic surgeon **Ulrich Dorn, MD**. "Wolfgang thought the American medical education system was strong because it was very Socratic and case-based," Dr. Sculco recalled. "The Iron Curtain had come down, and it became apparent that a lot of countries — such as Bulgaria, Romania, and the Czech Republic — had not had much exposure to Western technology."

"When the Iron Curtain fell, many in western Europe realized how badly medicine had fallen behind in Eastern Bloc countries," Dr. Bostrom added. "Wolfgang and others were seeing it on the ground and wanted to do something."

Dr. Sculco, a classical music fan and self-described "groupie" for the Vienna Philharmonic, has traveled to Austria annually. At a pivotal dinner in 1993, he met with Dr. Aulitzky; Antonio Gotto, Jr., MD, former Dean of Weill Cornell Medicine; and Clemens Hellsberg, then Vice Chair of the Vienna Philharmonic, and the idea of a weeklong seminar in orthopaedics was born. In recognition of his pivotal role, Dr. Sculco received the Austrian Cross of Honor, First Class, for Science and Art in 2013, and he became the first American to be elected as an honorary member of the Austrian Orthopedic Society.

"One of our missions at HSS is to support underserved orthopaedic surgeons and their patients, and this is one way to do it. It has a substantial impact on young surgeons who are at the beginning of their careers," he said.

Several faculty members from HSS and Weill Cornell Medicine are invited each year to join Austrian surgeons to present lectures and conduct workshops for 30 to 40 young English-speaking surgeons. The fellows are primarily from Central and Eastern Europe; others now hail from Africa, Asia, the former Soviet Union, Mexico, and nations in transition. An HSS orthopaedic surgeon co-directs the seminar with an Austrian surgeon. The Austrian co-director for the past several years has been Reinhard Windhager, MD, from Medical University of Vienna. The seminar is offered pro bono and is funded by the Austrian Federal Ministry of Science, Research and Economy, The Open Society Foundations, and corporate and individual donors.

The first seminars were held at Schloss Leopoldskron, the building whose backyard and lakefront grounds were featured heavily in *The Sound of Music*. The AAF purchased Schloss Arenberg, a state-of-the-art cultural and scientific center within walking distance of downtown Salzburg, in 2001, making it its permanent home and moving the seminars there in 2005.

Living and Learning Orthopaedics Together

At Schloss Arenberg, all seminar faculty and fellows spend a full week living, learning, and dining together. "The fellows were hungry for knowledge and we would teach them all day," said Dr. Sculco. "We'd have dinner with them afterward and there would be more conversations. We worked very hard and it was very successful."

"We had our meals with them and immersed ourselves into their world for five days," added HSS sports medicine surgeon **Thomas L. Wickiewicz, MD** (Fellow 1978, Resident 1981), who served as a seminar faculty member four times between 1994 and 1998.

There are five to eight hours of lectures each day as well as hands-on workshops, some of which feature new equipment brought by orthopaedic device manufacturers. In its earliest days, the majority of the fellows had practices focusing on musculoskeletal trauma, so most of the lectures centered on that topic.

Since then, topics have expanded to include total joint replacement, spine surgery, and sports medicine. "Over the past 20 years, the knowledge gap has continued to narrow," said Dr. Green, who

has lectured on topics such as pediatric fractures and knee injuries. Faculty for the 2025 seminar specialized in sports medicine, knee and shoulder surgery, complex spine surgery, musculoskeletal infections, adult reconstruction, bone healing, orthopaedic oncology, and foot surgery.

"It's so exciting to see bright-eyed young physicians with whom we have a global common interest. While multiple languages are spoken at this seminar, orthopaedic surgery is a universal language that we all share," explained HSS hand and upper extremity surgeon Lana Kang, MD (Fellow 2005). She has participated in the AAF-OMI seminar eight times between 2007 and 2021, lecturing on topics such as hand and distal radius fractures, carpometacarpal arthritis, compression neuropathies, and elbow contractures.

Getting By with Less

As is the case for physicians who travel abroad on medical missions, the AAF-OMI seminar can be an eye-opening opportunity for HSS faculty to see how surgeons from other countries practice their craft with fewer or different resources.

"We'd show them MRI slides, and some of them didn't even have an MRI in their country, let alone in their hospital," Dr. Wickiewicz noted. "These were smart people who just didn't have the resources we had to work with. They couldn't comprehend the amount of work we would do in one day. The lectures we gave could be life-changing for a young orthopaedist."

Dr. Sculco recalled their different approaches to the repair of hip fractures. "They were frustrated. Their biggest complaints had to do with the lack of money in their medical systems," he noted. "They were using the Austin Moore prosthesis for hip fractures, which we used in the 1950s and 1960s before hip replacements and hadn't used for 25 to 30 years. Some were more entrepreneurial than others, eager to start their own clinics."

HSS sports medicine surgeon **Anne M. Kelly, MD**, lectured on ACL reconstruction and arthroscopic shoulder surgery at the 2006, 2016, and 2022 seminars. She recalls two doctors from the former Soviet Georgia and from Slovakia who asked her to stay late to teach them in the lab. There was also a woman from Mongolia who was the only physician in a 400-square-mile radius and another from Ingushetia. "Many of them did not have access to the kinds of resources we have," said Dr. Kelly. "It was helpful for them to see the progression of care in our country, and how it could work for them if they could get their hands on these devices."

She added that fellows would often ask if the new tools they were learning about were disposable or reusable — and if they were disposable, how disposable. Could they maybe get two or three uses out of something? "They may use less equipment than we use or less pricey devices and do it the old-fashioned way, which for them had always worked fine," Dr. Kelly mentioned. "Everyone was excited to be together, with them not only learning from us, but us learning from them. Their enthusiasm was contagious."

HSS Faculty Both Give and Receive

The HSS faculty who are invited each year to participate in the seminar report benefiting as much from the experience as the fellows they teach. Being together in one building for a week in a foreign country forges lasting bonds between surgeons who may not have the chance to work together often back in New York City. "The fact that we live, eat, and sleep in the same place, somewhat like a dorm setting, enables us to get to know each other better personally and professionally in a way that is not possible at a hectic national orthopaedic conference or during our regular work schedules back home in New York," said Dr. Kang.

The experience can also make an HSS surgeon better appreciate the resources and systems they have back in the United States. "It is a very worthwhile venture, and I think people are very appreciative of it — both on the side of who gets to teach and who gets to be invited as a student," said Dr. Kelly.

"This program is a great opportunity for us to share the HSS approach on how we take care of our patients and to compare it with that of surgeons from other countries," Dr. Green added. "HSS faculty have the ability to engage young orthopaedic surgeons from around the world in a well-organized, supportive environment."

Being an AAF-OMI faculty member also fortifies teaching skills. "I was exposed

to so many fascinating backgrounds from surgeons who came from a plethora of countries. The environment is informal enough that attendees feel comfortable asking tough questions," said HSS spine surgeon **Francis C. Lovecchio, MD** (Resident 2021, Fellow 2022), who taught fellows about cervical myelopathy and other spine-related topics at the 2025 seminar. "I don't think many conferences have such an engaged audience. The knowledge exchange is truly extraordinary and the participants are not afraid to challenge you, which makes it a learning opportunity for all involved."

"Although designed for us to share knowledge with the fellows, I found that their questions made me take a critical look at my own work," added **Aleksey Dvorzhinskiy, MD, MSc** (Resident 2021), a trauma surgeon at HSS who lectured at the 2023 and 2025 seminars. In 2025, he addressed topics such as fracture healing biomechanics and elbow trauma and presented a two-hour trauma case conference. "Both sides gain insights into improving their practice, and everyone benefits."

For sports medicine surgeon **Claire D**. **Eliasberg**, **MD** (Resident 2022, Fellow 2023), participating in the 2025 seminar provided a meaningful opportunity to give back. "The chance to teach orthopaedic techniques to residents from developing countries while also learning from their experiences and perspectives was incredibly appealing," she explained. "The program's mission of global education and collaboration really resonated with me."

"For faculty, this program is an incredibly fulfilling experience," she continued. "It's not just about teaching — it's about connecting with passionate young surgeons from around the world and gaining insights into how orthopaedics is practiced globally. It's a great reminder of the global nature of our field and the importance of ongoing collaboration."

The Importance of Connecting with the World

In an age when online educational programs are now available at our fingertips around the clock, the AAF-OMI Bone and Joint Surgery seminar provides even more value through the in-person teaching it offers. "When you connect online, you can lose some interpersonal relationships. You may lose attention span and some of the connectivity between the learner and the teacher," said Dr. Sculco. "When you're in a room with an instructor and you have a question, you're more likely to raise the question than if you are on a Zoom meeting. And walking down a hallway after a session, you may have another opportunity to speak with the instructor."

The leadership and participation of HSS is a testament to the commitment of the Hospital to advancing orthopaedic care not only within our walls, but throughout the world — even in countries where an HSS surgeon may not step foot. "I think it's important for HSS alumni to realize that not only is HSS a powerhouse on the Upper East Side of Manhattan, but we are also extending ourselves internationally," Dr. Sculco added.

One-on-one relationships forged in Salzburg sometimes lead to surgeons coming to New York to visit HSS in person. Dr. Kang recalled one participant coming to HSS to do a rotation as an international guest. "I was so happy she could witness what Hospital for Special Surgery is like in 'real life' as opposed to HSS in a PowerPoint slide," she noted. "When she arrived in the United States, our conversations picked up right where we had left off in Europe."

"I'm an unapologetic globalist. I think it's important for our alumni to know that HSS remains engaged in the world and continues to do altruistic things in various ways," concluded Dr. Bostrom. "The large number of HSS practitioners participating as faculty in these seminars ultimately heightens the level of orthopaedic care around the world."

INTRODUCING THE 2024 ALUMNI ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING AWARD RECIPIENTS



At the 106th Alumni Association Annual Meeting last fall, five distinguished orthopaedic surgeons were honored. Meet them as they speak about their careers and what their experience at HSS has meant to them.

Russell F. Warren, MD

Resident 1973 HSS Attending Orthopaedic Surgeon Surgeon-in-Chief Emeritus Honor: Distinguished Alumnus Award



Most orthopaedic and sports medicine physicians know that Russell Warren is internationally renowned for his sports medicine expertise. They know him as an exemplary shoulder surgeon who co-developed the most widely used shoulder replacement system in the world. They know he's trained hundreds of residents and fellows. But what many may not know is that

Russell Warren, who played football for Columbia College, once played professional football himself.

"I got drafted by the Jets but signed with the Giants," Dr. Warren recalled. "I was there about a week before I got cut." He subsequently played football for the Providence Steamrollers before going to medical school at SUNY Upstate Medical University, where he earned his medical degree in 1966. Those experiences would herald a career that later included serving three decades as team physician for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants.

Dr. Warren completed his general surgery residency at St. Luke's Hospital, followed by a two-year deployment to Vietnam as Lt. Commander for the U.S. Navy. He received the U.S. Navy Medal of Commendation in 1969. He came to HSS to pursue his orthopaedic surgery residency, followed by a shoulder surgery fellowship at Columbia under Charles S. Neer II, MD.

After three years in private practice in Virginia, Dr. Warren returned to the academic environment of HSS that he had been missing. Working with the late John Marshall, MD, who founded the HSS Sports Medicine Service, he expanded his expertise in knee surgery and sports medicine. After Dr. Marshall died in a plane crash enroute to the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, New York, where he was to serve as team physician for the U.S. Olympic Ski Team, Dr. Warren became Chief of the Sports Medicine Service.

In the decades to follow, he and his HSS colleagues advanced arthroscopic surgery for the treatment of shoulder injuries and ACL tears, developed the Biomet Comprehensive Shoulder system in collaboration with **David M. Dines, MD**, conducted pioneering soft tissue research, and published more than 500 papers. As Surgeon-in-Chief of HSS from 1993 to 2003, Dr. Warren's leadership led to more than a tripling of the caseload — from 6,000 to 20,000 — and the establishment of the Women's Sports Medicine Center with **Jo A. Hannafin, MD, PhD**, and **Lisa R. Callahan, MD**, the Physiatry Service with

Gregory E. Lutz, MD, and the Primary Sports Medicine Service with **Brian C. Halpern, MD.** Dr. Warren has especially enjoyed training orthopaedic and sports medicine residents and fellows. As team physician for the Giants, he established a program where two fellows each season alternated weeks being on the field with the team so they could expand their knowledge of the care of professional athletes.

Dr. Warren maintains that at HSS, trainees can become who they want to be. "Write down your own questions and gradually see which ones you want to try to get an answer to," he said. "I've told residents and fellows that when they come to HSS, this place will help them be as good as they want to be."

Dermot O'Farrell, MCh, FRCSI, FRCSOrth Fellow 1997 and 1998

Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon, Croom Orthopaedic Hospital and University Hospital Limerick, Ireland Honor: Pier Giorgio Marchetti, MD, International Award



Established in 2010, this award recognizes outstanding lifetime achievement in orthopaedic surgery by an international fellow who trained at HSS. Dr. O'Farrell is a Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at Croom Orthopaedic Hospital and University Hospital Limerick in Ireland. He completed three fellowships during his training, including a hand surgery fellowship at Duke University. He

came to HSS in 1997, where he spent six months as a spine surgery fellow, followed by a one-year fellowship in shoulder and knee surgery.

At the time of his training, Ireland was experiencing a shortage of orthopaedic surgeons. "My training at HSS was the best preparation anyone could have," Dr. O'Farrell explained. "I was able to bring these procedures home to Ireland, where they were not being done routinely."

His career has been enormously gratifying. "I get tremendous satisfaction seeing a young person go back to playing their favorite sport and older folks go back to doing their normal daily activities in a pain-free manner," he said. "I feel humbled because it's such as privilege for me to operate on them and improve their quality of life."

In addition to caring for patients, Dr. O'Farrell has been involved in orthopaedic research and the teaching of medical students, residents, and junior colleagues. He has also chaired orthopaedic meetings in Ireland, such as the Irish Orthopaedic Association.

Dr. O'Farrell's family — including his wife, Julie, his son, his three daughters and their partners, and one grandchild accompanied him to the awards ceremony at HSS. "We had four children under the age of 7 when we were living in Manhattan during my fellowship," he remembered. "So we have a special affinity for this city."

He encourages trainees to learn new procedures so they can build a practice, keep up with the latest medical and surgical technologies, and always bear in mind that the patient and their dignity come first. Along the educational journey, however, it's important to remember one's family members. "The job is so all-consuming that we can sometimes forget we really need to spend quality time with our loved ones," said Dr. O'Farrell.

William Fred Hess, MD

Emeritus Chief of Spine Surgery, Janet Weiss Children's Hospital, Geisinger Medical Center, Danville, PA

Honor: Andrew N. Swanson, MD, Memorial Spine Award



Established in 2009, this award honors the memory of Andrew Swanson, MD, a spine surgeon who had been a resident at HSS (2005) and participated in regular humanitarian work before his death in 2009 in a mountain climbing accident. It is awarded to an HSS alumnus who has excelled in spine education, research, practice, or humanitarian efforts.

This year's recipient, Dr. Hess, did not train at HSS but joined HSS alumni in humanitarian work — particularly missions with Oheneba Boachie-Adjei, MD, former Chief of the HSS Scoliosis Service, at the FOCOS Orthopaedic Hospital in Accra, Ghana starting in 2002. Dr. Hess and his family members also participated in Families for Missions and other humanitarian trips which took him to countries such as Haiti, Jamaica, Ecuador, and Barbados.

Dr. Hess received his medical degree from the University of South Florida in Tampa, where he also completed his general surgery internship and orthopaedic surgery residency. He then completed the Rae R. Jacobs Spine Fellowship at the University of Kansas Medical Center. He has had a distinguished career treating adults and children with all types of spine disorders — including spine trauma, scoliosis, kyphosis, tumors, and post-traumatic deformities — and has performed complex reconstructive spine procedures.

"The blessings that we have and the way we apply our trade and learn to take care of people has a long-lasting legacy for our patients," Dr. Hess told the audience at the annual meeting. "It's even more important when you can do that for people who would never have the opportunity to provide the care we're able to provide. That's the beauty of being in missions."

Christopher M. Brusalis, MD

Resident 2022 HSS Sports Medicine Surgeon Honor: Lance Peters, MD, Memorial Biomechanics Award



This award was established by the Residency Class of 1999 and recognizes a current or recent HSStrained researcher for an outstanding published paper in biomechanics research. Dr. Lance Peters completed his residency at HSS in 1999 and a fellowship in 2001. The award was created in recognition of his extensive involvement in biomechanics during his orthopaedic training. Dr. Brusalis received this award for his paper

"Medial Meniscus Posterior Root Tears Lead to Changes in Joint Contact Mechanisms at Low Flexion Angles During Simulated Gait," which was published in the *American Journal of Sports Medicine* in January 2024.

He earned his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania Perelman School of Medicine, followed by an orthopaedic residency at HSS in 2022, a sports medicine fellowship at Rush University, and the North American Traveling Fellowship. "Our treatments, both nonsurgical and surgical, are quite successful at returning patients to the activities that give their life meaning," said Dr. Brusalis. "I especially love when I treat one family member, who then refers their spouse, parent, or grandparent to me. It's a truly rewarding way to practice medicine."

In his study, Dr. Brusalis and his colleagues studied the impact of meniscal root tears on knee function during a normal gait. They tested cadaveric knees using state-of-the-art biomechanical sensors and reported that meniscal root tears increase knee loading throughout much of the gait cycle.

"This study reflects the collaboration of an interdisciplinary team of surgeons and biomechanical engineers at HSS," he explained. "Our findings have implications for both the treatment and post-surgical rehabilitation of patients with meniscal root injuries."

Matthew M. Roberts, MD

Resident 2002 Chief Emeritus, HSS Foot and Ankle Service Honor: 2024 Alumni Association President



Dr. Roberts was in college when he began thinking about medical school. He spent a summer volunteering in a Bronx hospital emergency department and felt inspired to follow medicine as a path. After graduating from Rice University, he earned a medical degree at the University of Texas in Houston and completed an orthopaedic residency at HSS in 2002. Dr. Roberts then spent a

year in Seattle pursuing a fellowship in foot and ankle surgery at Harborview Medical Center. A specialty in foot and ankle surgery appealed to him for its need and complexity. "You can treat a wide range of problems — sports, reconstruction, trauma, older people, younger people — and offer a diverse set of solutions," he noted.

In his practice, Dr. Roberts offers his expertise in Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease, bunions, foot deformities, and trauma. Leading HSS' Foot and Ankle Service from 2013 to 2024 into one of the best in the country and educating residents have been highlights of his work. "I have gotten to know a great group of people and hopefully positively influenced their experience here," Dr. Roberts said. He estimates having trained more than 200 residency graduates over the past 22 years, and in 2019, was honored to receive the Nancy Kane Bischoff Award for Resident Mentorship from HSS' graduating residents. During the past few years, with the support of the Foot and Ankle Service, Dr. Roberts and his wife, Ann, began a new tradition welcoming residents and fellows to the Hudson Valley for a Saturday afternoon of apple picking, lunch, and fall foliage — just one small way to encourage them to remember work-life balance. "Much like my mentors at HSS did for me," he recalled.

As President of the HSS Alumni Association, Dr. Roberts welcomed the 2024 Annual Meeting attendees and encouraged alumni to visit. "The residencies and fellowships are strong," he said. "We hope that you stay in touch, come back, and pay us a visit."

Paul F. Lachiewicz, MD

Resident 1982 and Fellow 1983

It is with heavy hearts that we note the passing on May 5, 2024 of alumnus **Paul F. Lachiewicz, MD**. Dr. Lachiewicz was a consulting professor at Duke Ortho and an attending surgeon at the Durham VA Medical Center, with a career focus on total hip and knee arthroplasty. He was an AOA graduate of Weill Cornell Medical College and completed his residency and fellowship at HSS. Following fellowship, he joined the faculty of the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at UNC-Chapel Hill before retiring in 2009 at the rank of Professor.

Dr. Lachiewicz was a member of the Southern Orthopaedic Association since 1985 and served on the Board of Directors as Program Chair and President in 2011. In 2023, he received the SOA L. Andrew Koman, MD, Distinguished Southern Orthopaedist Award at its 40th annual meeting. Dr. Lachiewicz was also an active member of the Knee Society, the International Hip Society, and the Hip Society serving as President in 2014. A prolific researcher and investigator, Dr. Lachiewicz had over 200 scientific papers and book chapters specializing in clinical research on thromboembolism prophylaxis, total hip and knee revision surgery, and peri-operative pain management.

Paul was a vocal and loyal alumnus of HSS. He loved to share his memories of his time in New York and the tremendous impact that HSS had on his career.


